According to information from the Keller Family Community Foundation, Nick has many friends and family who have cancer, who have survived cancer, or who have died as a result of cancer.

think of ways I could further help people with cancer," said Nick Keller in a letter requesting sponsorship for "Snowball Cancer Challenge."


