Snowmobile ride aims to break record, rai

Money going to foundation created to aid families affected by cancer

Nick Keller plans on starting quite the personal journey the day after Christmas. And he's welcoming as many as possible to follow along.

Depending on snow amounts, Keller plans on starting a 12,200-mile snowmobile trek from his home near Richmond, southwest of St. Cloud,

This is not just a story about a man who loves riding snowmobiles, and it's not about his attempt to break the world record for the most miles snowmobiled in 60 consecutive days. He's on a mission for a cause.

Keller, who averages more than 5,000 miles a year on snowmobile, was approached about attempting

to beat the current 60-day record of 12,163 miles. "I said I would try it if I could tie it in to a cause," the 55-year-old self-employed mason contractor said.

"My daughter asked me what I was going to do with the money I raise, and I said that I'd probably give it to the Cancer Society," he said. "She suggested that I try to find a way to get the money to the families affected by the cancer.

Keller's daughter Julie works in the intensive care unit at a St. Cloud hospital and she sees firsthand the effect on the cancer survivors.

Out of that was born the Keller Family Community Foundation.

In addition to Julie's work with cancer families, her father rattled off the names of near and dear ones who have been inflicted with cancer like he was naming off a guest list for a family reunion.

This past March marked the 20th year since his mother, Mary Jane, died of breast cancer. "She died when she was 56 and I turn 56 next April, so I thought it was a good time to try this."

The KFCF has established 501c3 non-profit status and is now in the fundraising mode.

Keller's world-record attempt is aptly named the Snowball Cancer Challenge, because he has been amazed at how the interest in his journey has snowballed.
